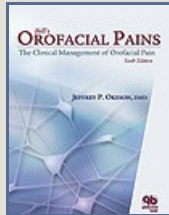

The clinical characteristics of TN include the presence of trigger zones, and innocuous stimuli in these areas lead to pain. A short gap between the stimulation of a trigger zone and pain onset may be observed and is termed latency. However, TN attacks are often spontaneous and triggers are not always present or identifiable [14].
